BL509-1 Survey of the New Testament	Classroom 5	3-5:50pm
A survey of the New Testament beginning with principles involved in interpreting NT literature. Gives an overview Gospels with an emphasis upon Second Temple Judaism and the social worlds of Galilee, Samaria, and Judea. Also covers historical issues in the Book of Acts and the development of the church in the Pauline and General letters as well as the eschatology of the Book of Revelation. Develops the ability to think biblically, interrelate theological convictions, and make personal application.

BC502-1 Advanced Expository Communication	Classroom 4	5-6:50pm
Refines the student's ability to preach expository sermons with clarity and relevance. Emphasis moves from rhetorical skills to the art of preaching. Focuses on OT prophetic and wisdom texts, the ethics of preaching and the role of preaching in the larger context of pastoral ministry.

The course is designed to hone your skills of graduate theological research, reading, and writing. You will learn argumentation, effective reading strategies, how to format your papers, and how to use the library. This class will greatly enhance your ability to perform at the graduate level. Also, this course helps set the stage for the student's seminary career as it relates to spiritual, emotional, and physical health.

CF517-1 Theory and Application of Mindfulness and Contemplative Practices in Counseling

Classroom 5

9–10:50am

This course provides an overview of theories and practices of mindfulness (the ability to attend in a nonjudgmental way to one's own physical and mental processes) and contemplation as related to various health and risk outcomes (wellbeing, depression, anxiety, sleep, etc.) in counseling. Mechanisms by which mindfulness may influence health will be addressed. Students will be taught various practices including historical approaches to contemplation, current approaches to relaxation, and mindfulness meditation. Students will be introduced to commonalities in behavioral health therapies such as Acceptance and Commitment Therapy (ACT), Dialectic Behavior Therapy (DBT), Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction (MBSR), Mindfulness-Based Cognitive Therapy (MBCT), as well as the neuroscience behind such approaches to addressing emotional dysregulation. Students will learn to incorporate these practices in their own development as counselors in order to cultivate a grounded, nonreactive, non-anxious presence with others/clients.

You will acquire a methodology for extracting and interpreting the unique aspects of this Gospel, develop an appreciation of its literary composition and produce exegetically-based applications for contemporary Christianity. Work in the Greek New Testament as well as an application-focused research paper are required.

This course introduces students to Systematic Theology prolegomena (theological introduction) and focuses on Bibliology (the Word of God) and Theology Proper (the person of God). Students will learn theological method and the doctrines of inspiration, inerrancy, the authority of Scripture, the nature of God, the Trinity, creation, and providence. Additionally, students will build their own theological convictions regarding these doctrines and think about how these doctrines apply to their own lives and to the churches they serve.

Students have 10 hours of direct experience as a group member in a small group activity over the course of one academic term.
