TUITION POLICIES

- NT513-1 New Testament Greek 2** **Classroom 7** **1–3:50pm**
 This course is a continuation of NT512, completing the elementary Greek grammar sequence. It completes the introduction to grammar, paradigms, and decisions and introduces the student to read the Greek New Testament.
 3 credits Instructor: [Dr. Peter Gurry](#) Prerequisite: NT512
- OT513-1 Old Testament Hebrew 2** **Classroom 2** **1–3:50pm**
 A continuation of OT512, completing the elementary Hebrew grammar sequence. It completes the introduction to grammar and paradigms and introduces the student to reading the Hebrew Old Testament.
 3 credits Instructor: [Dr. John Meade](#) Prerequisite: OT512
- MS502-1 Introduction to Biblical Counseling** **Classroom 8** **4–5:50pm**
 Examines the biblical foundation for pastoral counseling as well as the historical role and origin of the care of persons within the church. Biblical principles for guiding, sustaining, healing and reconciling individuals are explored as are common circumstances that draw people to seek biblical counsel and care.
 2 credits Instructor: [Dr. John Trent](#)
- BL507-1 Survey of the General Epistles & Revelation** **Classroom 7** **7:30–9:20pm**
 A survey of the General Epistles and Revelation. Special attention is given to the Jewish and Greco-Roman social worlds of the authors and to how their inspired, Jesus-centered teachings form believers today. Develops your ability to think biblically by interrelating theological convictions and making personal application.
 2 credits Instructor: [Dr. Peter Gurry](#)

- TH513-1 Soteriology, Ecclesiology, and Eschatology** **Classroom 7** **1–3:50pm**
 This course introduces students to soteriology (salvation), ecclesiology (church), and eschatology (last things). Additionally, students will build their own theological convictions regarding these doctrines and think about how these doctrines apply to their own lives and to the churches they serve.
 3 credits Instructor: [Dr. Steve Duby](#)
- NT540-1 Advanced Greek Grammar (Greek Exegesis)** **Classroom 2** **1–3:50pm**
 An intensive study of Koine Greek based on the major historic Greek grammars, developments in linguistics, and an inductive study of select portions of the Greek Bible, especially the New Testament.
 3 credits Instructor: [Dr. Peter Gentry](#) Prerequisite: NT512, NT513, and NT514
 Note: This is also a ThM course available to MDiv students with 60 credit hours completed and a cumulative GPA of 3.25 who have been accepted into the ThM program. MDiv students taking Advanced Greek Grammar should have at least 9 credit hours of Greek. ThM course code is NT640-1 (see Master of Theology section).
- BL509-1 Survey of the New Testament** **Classroom 5** **3–5:50pm**
 A survey of the New Testament beginning with principles involved in interpreting NT literature. Gives an overview Gospels with an emphasis upon Second Temple Judaism and the social worlds of Galilee, Samaria, and Judea. Also covers historical issues in the Book of Acts and the development of the church in the Pauline and General letters as well as the eschatology of the Book of Revelation. Develops the ability to think biblically, interrelate theological convictions, and make personal application.
 3 credits Instructor: [Dr. Peter Gurry](#)

- IS511-1 World Religions and Cults** Classroom 6 3–5:50pm
 This course introduces students to the major world religions and New Religious Movements by examining their principal doctrines and practices. Special emphasis is given to Folk Religion (Animism), Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, Mormonism, Jehovah's Witnesses, New Age, and Neopagan Religions. Various approaches and strategies for witness to these religious groups from an evangelical Christian perspective are also studied.
 3 credits Instructor: [Dr. Malcolm Hartnell](#)
- MS509-1 Competencies for Ministry Leadership** Classroom 2 4:30-6:20pm
 Explore principles for ministry that are biblically accurate and culturally relevant. You will learn practical ways to keep these principles in focus in the press of personal and ministry responsibilities.
 2 credits Instructor: [Dr. Bryan Fergus](#)
- BC498-1 Graduate Research and Writing** Classroom 7 5–5:50pm
 This course is an essential introduction to graduate theological education at Phoenix Seminary. Every discipline has its unique style and formatting – theology is no exception. The course is designed to hone your skills of graduate theological research, reading, and writing. You will learn argumentation, effective reading strategies, how to format your papers, and how to use the library. This class will greatly enhance your ability to perform at the graduate level. Also, this course helps set the stage for the student's seminary career as it relates to spiritual, emotional, and physical health.
 1 credit Instructor: [Mr. Cole Peck](#)
 Note: All new Spring students are required to take this course except for Master of Arts in Counseling students.
- BC502-1 Advanced Expository Communication** Classroom 7 6:30-8:20pm
 Refines the student's ability to preach expository sermons with clarity and relevance. Emphasis moves from rhetorical skills to the art of preaching. Students are introduced to narrative-exposition as a preaching model. Focuses on OT prophetic and wisdom texts, the ethics of preaching and the role of preaching in the larger context of pastoral ministry.
 2 credits Instructor: [Dr. Chuck Newkirk](#) Prerequisite: BC501 and at least one course from BL502–BL507
 Note: Enrollment is limited to 12 credit students.
- BL515-1 Hermeneutics: Principles of Interpretation** Classroom 6 6:30-9:20pm
 Hermeneutics teaches the theory and practice of interpretation. In addition to learning a careful method, this course surveys the history of biblical interpretation and introduces philosophy of language in order to make competent interpreters of Scripture. This course will also teach how to apply the ancient truths of the Bible to the contemporary world.
 3 credits Instructor: [Dr. Steve Duby](#)
- CF521-1 Clinical Assessment and Diagnosis** Classroom 8 6:30–9:20pm
 Study of clinical assessment and appraisal, psychopathology, DSM-V and ICD-10 diagnostic categories, differential diagnosis, the use and role of assessment in treatment planning, and historical and cultural factors and concerns in the assessment and diagnosis of mental illness.
 3 credits Instructor: [Dr. William Mobley](#)

- TH511-1 Prolegomena, Scripture, and God** Classroom 7 1–3:50pm
 This course introduces students to Systematic Theology prolegomena (theological introduction) and focuses on Bibliology (the Word of God) and Theology Proper (the person of God). Students will learn theological method and the doctrines of inspiration, inerrancy, the authority of Scripture, the nature of God, the Trinity, creation, and providence. Additionally, students will build their own theological convictions regarding these doctrines and think about how these doctrines apply to their own lives and to the churches they serve.

- TH516-1 Christian Ethics** **Classroom 2** **1–3:50pm**
 This course will provide students with an overview of Christian ethics, placing particular emphasis on contemporary sexual ethics. The class will lay a biblical foundation for moral decision making and will then look at various specific contemporary issues, such as: abortion, racial justice, poverty, homosexuality, sexual abuse, pornography, sexual healing, divorce and remarriage, birth control and reproductive technology, euthanasia, and lying.

- CF520-1 Professional and Ethical Issues in Counseling** **Classroom 8** **3–5:50pm**
 Study of professional ethics and responsibilities, legal standards and obligations, roles and functions, professional organizations and credentialing, and professional conduct and concerns in the practice of counseling.
 3 credits Instructor: [Ms. Billie Moffit](#)
- SF501-1 Living in God's Presence: Knowing our Triune God** **Classroom 7** **4–5:50pm**
 This course challenges students to take a fresh look at the Christian life of fellowship with the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit through the lens of God's transforming grace and unchanging truth. Through reflection and experiential engagement, students are invited to encounter our Triune God through a variety of classical spiritual disciplines while examining their own priorities.
 2 credits Instructor: [Dr. Rick Eford](#)
- MA504-A Integrative Seminar IV: Proclamation (Trinity Bible Church)** **4:30–8:30pm AND Individual time to be arranged**
 An intensive supervised ministry experience focused on the development of leadership competencies and consisting of the following: ministry service in a pre-approved setting, involvement in a formal church-based internship/ministerial training program, and appropriate academic requirements that will enhance the student's understanding of ministerial leadership.
