### TUITION POLICIES

**Spouse Tuition Policy (Partners in Ministry):** Spouses of MDiv, MAC, MA(BTS), MAM, Graduate Diploma and Diploma students may enroll for credit courses and non-credit courses with no cost for tuition. Fees will apply and the spouse's enrollment hours cannot exceed the number of hours taken by the primary student. Spouses must complete the Application for Admission at <https://ps.edu/apply/> (if not yet admitted) and then register for classes.

**Alumni Tuition Policy:** All graduates of Phoenix Seminary's credit programs may register for any course (with the exception of TH504 or DMin courses) as non-credit auditors with no charge for tuition. Fees will apply.
